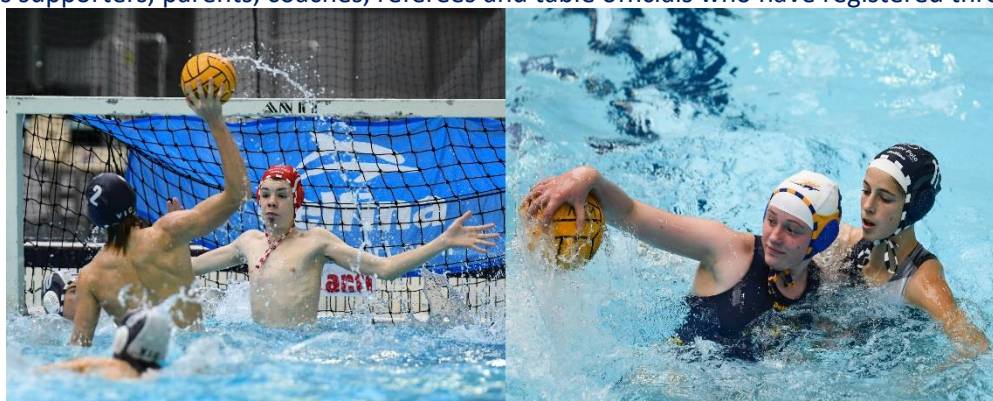

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Serving as the board chair for Water Polo Victoria has been one of the most humbling opportunities for me. I was elected Chairman in 2022, when the organisation faced financial, organisational and performance challenges. Water Polo Victoria had to deal with our most significant challenge of all—the COVID-19 pandemic consequences. I was asked to apply both the love of our sport with national & international connections, and also private sector commercial mindset to start transforming our organisation to a professional setup. I would not have said Yes, without knowing the creative and financial support of our board, our CEO and his team and especially our community.

When I arrived, Water Polo Victoria had gone through management change, was in debt, lacking the focus and unity it needed to serve the clubs and support its membership. Thanks to the dedication of athletes, coaches, officials, volunteers and parents, we have been able to advance our mission. Whilst our home work is nowhere near done, we are in a better place today than we were a year ago.

One of our first priorities was to define and clearly communicate our strategy and related growth pillars with the first part of our mission based on growing the sport. I am happy to report that we have reached pre-Covid membership levels. Our women's numbers have increased at a greater rate than our men's have, and we have also grown outside of our traditional "home base". Regarding overall membership, Victoria is fourth nationally behind the "tier 1" States of NSW, QLD and WA. This is a great outcome of the efforts of the last 12 months.

We have also started focusing on our youngest members, which is expected to take off across our State. Learn to Water Polo is a great example for this concentrated effort, with support from Water Polo Australia.

According to the most recent annual report of Water Polo Australia, Victoria did well on Learn to Swim, scoring the highest number nationally by a long margin, but we have some work to do across universities and schools. We have continued to add competitions such as the East Coast Challenge, which was a great success. Our U15 and U17 State teams participated in the Nationals Competitions in Canberra and Sydney respectively. This event is always a great opportunity to set the benchmark for where Water Polo Victoria needs to be.

Competitiveness is primarily reflected via Nationals and related domestic and international competitions, this is where the Vic High Performance Program will need to deliver impact, in close collaboration with the clubs. We made the investment to appoint a dedicated State High Performance Manager and we are further increasing focus on creating performance training sessions.

Affordability remains a concern of our sport. To this effect, we will work with national and State bodies to introduce special programs to help those who need financial assistance in order to fully participate.

Supporting regional Victoria better is another critical part of our definition of success. The recognition Geelong received from Federal Government made us all proud. The Tri State competition has been a great success. We will define new ways of engaging regional clubs and communities more. As a starting point, we introduced the bi-monthly Club Presidents meeting, where we openly discuss challenges and opportunities, with Water Polo Victoria as service provider.

There are many to thank for these results, and I am fortunate to serve with a serious, dedicated group of professionals that have kept our eye on the ball for the last 12 months. I would like to especially thank our CEO and all the board members who served over my first year. Board service is a major volunteering commitment and my colleagues have taken that commitment seriously and our organisation is better for it.

It is my privilege to serve Water Polo Victoria, and I look forward to continuing my support and counsel in the years ahead. Thank you for your partnership and the opportunity.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER REPORT

Another year has flown by with plenty of things happening both in and out of the pool. We have come to the end of finalising our governance processes with many major projects to be approved/launched at the 2023/24 AGM.

- The By-Laws will continue to be reviewed annually with feedback received from all stakeholders.
- The Water Polo Victoria Constitution has been developed, reviewed by stakeholders, received club engagement and is ready to be presented and voted at the AGM. This body of work went through an extensive process with consultation being the key to deliver a positive outcome.
- The Water Polo Victoria Strategic Plan has been developed, reviewed by stakeholders and is also ready to be launched at the AGM and then publicly. This document strategically aligns with Water Polo Australia aims, however is specific to the outcomes desired by Water Polo Victoria. The operational plan in relation to how we intend to achieve our strategic vision will continue to evolve as we move through the years.

We as a sport will continue to focus on a number of development initiatives to engage the broader community in Water Polo;

- Learn to Polo – A new initiative being produced with a partner and WPA to deliver in swim centres.
- Social Polo – Entry into the sport in a casual, fun and informative environment. Initial 6 week program had participants from varying degrees of ability. We had a number of clubs support the program by providing coaches for sessions.
- Winter Invasion – Engaging winter sports to take up water polo as a preseason alternative. We are working with facilities and winter sports (Soccer, football, netball) clubs to get more people trying the sport. The aim will be that some clubs will make this part of their annual program.
- Schools/universities – engaging with schools/universities and school organisations to implement Water Polo competitions. Support existing competitions (AGSV, APS, and GSV), but also look at the potential to running new competitions (Gala Days, School Sport Victoria competitions).

Our State Program continues to develop, and it was pleasing to see not only the 15s, 17s and 19s programs thrive but for a first in a long time we were able to send 4 state teams to a national event with a big representation of athletes from Victoria involved in the 13s development event in Hobart. We hope that we can continue to work with all these young athletes so they can continue to progress through the talent pathway.

We had a great representation of athletes in Aus squads and travelling tours which was fantastic to see. They not only represented Victoria well, but their club and families. With the improvement of our State programs we hope to continue providing athletes for these tours moving forward.

The staff that I have supporting me Regan Longfield, Perri Randall, Greig Richardson and previously Thomas Swords have been outstanding. With so many different aspects of the business and at stages all individuals having to wear many hats we are still able to deliver big outcomes for the sport.

Regan's role in the space of development, inclusion, schools and delivering the 10 x component of Water Polo Australia's vision has seen our sport delivered in a number of new facilities to a number of new community groups. It is hoped with this initial drive that we will be able to make these participants see the value in the sport and therefore they become full members of Water Polo Victoria.

The competition space continues to grow and Perri does a phenomenal job in ensuring everything is humming along nicely. Not only managing the weekly summer/autumn/winter competitions but Perri has been instrumental in helping to deliver events such as the Vic Country Championships, the Delfina Interstate Challenge, and more recently the East Coast Challenge with great success.

Greig (Spindles as he is known pool side) joined us early 2023 as our High Performance Manager in a newly created role. This role is important for the development of not only our next generation athletes, but also our next generation coaches. The increase in participation at our academies and state programs along with the introduction of our development program has provided Water Polo Victoria with a great opportunity to get more athletes involved in high performance. There is now a clear pathway structure that athletes can follow if they wish to develop their game and play at the highest level possible.

A big thanks to our State/Academy coaches who gave their time and energy in delivering their respective programs. The experience/improvement the athletes have is down to the work you do. Water Polo Victoria is continuing to invest in coaching so I encourage anyone who is interested in getting involved please do irrespective of what level (club, development etc).

I would like to thank the Board of Water Polo Victoria the support since I have started here has been fantastic and now as a collective we are focused on the future of the sport puts us in a good position.

I would like to thank our referees/pool controllers/mentors, they have arguably the toughest roles within the organisation and this is often a thankless role. Similar to coaching we are investing time and effort to their development and education and hopefully with club support we should be able increase our numbers as we grow membership wise.

I would like finish by thanking the clubs, committees, volunteers, participants, and parents/guardians. The membership base of any organisation drives success, and for the 2022/23 season we had a phenomenal membership base who helped us deliver many successes. To see so many people playing our sport, watching finals games, supporting our State athletes is fantastic. We look forward to continued progress both in and out of the pool for everyone.

DEVELOPMENT & ACADEMY REPORT

The 2022-23 year has been a highly productive period for Water Polo Victoria regarding participation and development. WPA's Project 10X focused on four key pillars to bring new participants into the sport, these being Learn to Swim, Schools, Winter Invasion Sports and Universities. WPV development initiatives fell within these pillars, as well other avenues of opportunity. Below is a snapshot of the scope of work within the development space during the 22-23 Financial Year.

- Learn to Swim x Water Polo engagement. Water Polo equipment and skills had been integrated into LTS programming at several venues, including Aligned Leisure, Paul Sadler Swimland and MGGS. Over 8,000 participants were exposed to the sport through LTS.
- WPV partnered with WPA and Pride in Sport to deliver a LGBTQIA+ program in Bendigo, *Polo for All*.
- The *Polo Pups* program engaged over two hundred school aged students in Water Polo sessions, from varying schools across the state.
- 6 Week Adult Social Polo program engaged 35 new participants, many engaging further with Water Polo clubs and participating in competition
- WPV organised competition fixtures and referees for AGSV School competition, which had a total of 22 teams between Years 7 & 12.
- Successfully applied for an SRV Together More Active Grant, which will be used to upskill leaders across the sport over the next four years.
- Worked with MOVE Moonee Valley to deliver Water Polo sessions for an All-Abilities program with over 50 unique participants
- Various engagements at University Orientations, centre *Come & Try* events and other initiatives

Through development initiatives, Water Polo Victoria continues to engage with new stakeholders, hold discussions to form lucrative partnerships and collaborate on projects and programs all aimed at increasing the exposure of the sport to as many within the community as possible. In turn, we believe the more tangible opportunities and pathways provided by the peak state body, the more likelihood of return on investment through player growth, brand reputation and engagement.

I would like to thank everyone within the community for their support and vision regarding the importance of development as a key strategic aim of the organisation, particularly in growing the reach and accessibility of the sport to a larger audience. The list above is just some of the work that has been done within this space, and I look forward to working with many more stakeholders to grow this great sport in Victoria.



Our Elite Pathway programs have enjoyed steady growth over the 22-23 period, including growth in participants, coaches and the development of the program content. Academy ran in Terms 3 & 4 of 2022, and Terms 1 & 2 of 2023, whilst WPV introduced the Development Program in Term 2 of 2023.

The Development program is aimed to provide an entry level for kids (11+) to continue to develop their skills and knowledge within the sport of Water Polo and provide a tangible pathway into the more elite WPV Academy program as they develop.

Greig Richardson was appointed the High-Performances Manager in Term 1 of 2023, and had overseen the entire Elite Pathway, including Academy and Development. We have also seen multiple coaches given the opportunity to enhance their own skills and work with our young talent, this includes Chloe Lim, Ben Adams, Dean Saltas, Hayley Morrison, Maddie Morrison, Mel Di Donato, Jade Vidal and Tyson Mutsch.

Participant numbers 22-23 - Academy (166 total athlete impressions - Term 3 2022 – 38, Term 4 2022 – 25, Term 1 2023 – 43, Term 2 2023 – 60)

Participant numbers 22-23 - Development (19 participants in the inaugural Term 2 2023 program)

Key Highlights:

- 1. Growth of Team Roster:** This year, the VIC academy experienced strong growth, with the addition of established and dedicated players who have enhanced the overall skill level and competitive spirit of both training groups.
- 2. Skill and Technique Development:** Our focus on skill and technique development has yielded solid results, as evident by the notable improvements in many of the performances of individual players and the collective performance of their respective teams.
- 3. Competitions:** State Teams have had good numbers at trials, making selection decisions quite difficult, this can be attributed in part due to a more vibrant Academy. Achieving success in competitions both at the regional and national levels will improve as our athlete's commitment to academy attendance & training intensity improve. One of the goals of the WPV Academy is to advance the culture of player expectations regarding volume and work ethic. We have made good steps in the right direction this year.
- 4. Female Participation:** Female participation in the WPV Academy has increased steadily over the year. In Term 4 of 2022 we had 13 girls, which increased to 22 in Term 1 of 2023.
- 5. WPV Investment:** The addition of the Wednesday Development program creates an opportunity for younger athletes to get an initial taste of the high-performance pathway, whilst also helping them develop for club competition and national tournaments, such as the U13 Hobart event. WPV have, and will continue to, provide support and equipment that helps improve the quality of the Academy program for the participants and parents.

Water Polo Victoria looks forward to growing these programs and creating a strong elite pathway and culture of excellence and success!

Summer State League Competition 2022 -2023

We hit the water with a splash for the return of our Summer State League, which ran from October 2022 – April 2023. With an increase of three teams, compared to Summer 2022. The finals series played primarily at Caulfield Grammar provided an exciting atmosphere and more importantly, a return to a 30m pool for our Men's SL1 competition.

Autumn/Winter State League Competition 2023

63 teams took to the water for the Autumn and 65 teams for the Winter 'mini series' of 5 games and a laddered final game. This competition format provided teams with an opportunity to play a more social water polo. On the junior side of the competition, it was pleasing to have 14U Boys playing through the year for the first time in many years.

Other Tournaments

Several events took place in the first 6 months of 2023;

- Polo by the Pier at Portsea managed by Old Meburnians
- Victorian Country Championships managed by WPV with support from Geelong Marlins.
- Men's and Women's State country teams
 - Headed to Ballina for the Australian Country Championships, where our men's team took out the Gold medal with some solid performances in the pool
- We again hosted the East Coast Challenge Tournament
 - This is used as a warm up for 15U National State Championships.
 - We hosted teams from Tasmania, Queensland, NSW and Victoria across the male and female competitions.

There are many people who make our competitions possible. Firstly, to all of the players and the parents of junior players, thank you for your willingness to participate and the positive attitudes observed around the pool deck. David Smyth, thank you for coordinating the Pool Controllers and Referees. To Daniel Flahive, we are lucky to have you in Victoria, thank you for being so generous with your time.

REFEREES REPORT

General

During the 2022/23 financial year we held:

- The first State Championships across the summer months for some time, running from mid October 2022 to late March 2023
- An Autumn competition running during the school Term 2
- A Winter competition running during the school Term 3

The referees available for these competitions currently number 63 (Appendix, Table 1). This number is up from the 55 in the previous report. This is mainly due to the pleasing increase in junior players who are showing an interest in refereeing.

New Referee Mentor positions

These positions were created late last year and have been a valuable addition to the development of our referees.

These are generally taken from the senior WPV referee ranks and are mostly appointed to Thursday evening and Sunday games. The current list includes: Danny Flahive, Alby Morrison, Michael McNeill, David Smyth, Matthew Lea and Garry Rydberg. They have already proven to be a valuable way to improve our younger, developing referees.

Referee Education

Referee Education was offered to all referees prior to summer competition commencing in Sept of 2023. Water Polo Australia National Officials Manager Michael Hart presented at 2 sessions which provided invaluable content for those who attended. WPV are looking at ways to engage our referees throughout the season to continue the education component. WPA are currently updating their online portal to allow referees to do online learning.

New WPV Referee tops

The new referee tops were designed, approved and ready for distribution at the start of the 2022-23 State Championships. Most referees now have these tops with reserve supplies available.

Other Opportunities

We had several referees assist us throughout 2022/23 season with opportunities outside of our traditional competitions. APS and AGSV School sports competitions took place in Sept/Oct of 2022 and was well supported by our referees. We want to continue to use these opportunities to provide upskilling of our referees. We also hosted the U15s Delfina East Coast Challenge with State teams from QLD, NSW, ACT and TAS joining VIC teams as a warm up event prior to the 15 & U NSC. On this occasion we also had Water Polo Australia National Officials Manager Michael Hart in attendance to provide feedback to all referees who were involved.

Junior Referee Development

Development opportunities have widened to some extent at the national level for our younger referees.

In 2023, we had a number of opportunities for promising junior referees to perform at national competitions. WPA introduced a new 13 & Under National Development Carnival in Hobart early July. Attending this were Olivia Hallam, Karly Flahive and Indy Nay. David Smyth attended as a Delegate.

With the now annual WPA underage National State Championships, there are more chances for our referees to experience higher level competition. At the 15 & Under, 17 & Under and 19 & Under NSCs this year, WPV attending referees were: Danny Flahive, Olivia Hallam, Karly Flahive and James Calabro.

Both James and Olivia were appointed to Championship medal games.

The Perth AYC in January 2023 had a number of WPV Referees attending as referees or Delegates: Olivia Hallam, Indy Nay, Danny Flahive, Michael McNeill and David Smyth.

We have also seen a big increase in junior referees being appointed to the Sunday junior games where they can be mentored both by their older peers (listed above) and the senior Referee Mentors mentioned previously.



Note 1. Statement of significant accounting policies

1. Statement of significant accounting policies

a) Statement of compliance

The committee has determined that the incorporated association is not a reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial statements. The financial report is a special purpose financial report which has been prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the *Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012*.

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with following Australian Accounting Standards:

b) Basis of measurement

The financial statements have been prepared on an accrual basis and are based on historical cost and do not take into account changing money values except where specifically stated.

c) Plant & Equipment

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all PE is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

d) Impairment of Assets

At each reporting date the committee assesses whether there is objective evidence that a financial instrument has been impaired. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the income statement.

e) Income tax

The association is a not-for-profit organisation and is exempt from income tax under section 50-45 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

f) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits, held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities cash within three months.

g) Revenue

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable. Donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

h) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of an asset or as part of an item of expense. Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of GST.

i) Trade creditors and other payables

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the company during the reporting period, which remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days on recognition of the liability.

j) Employee provisions

Provision is made for the associations liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by the end of the reporting period. Employee provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.
